Chaplaincy Teams

In September we will be recruiting new members for the St. Anthony's Chaplaincy Team.

Our chaplaincy team aims to play a leading role in the Catholic Life of our school by supporting community projects, leading assemblies, Acts of Worship in classes and our weekly prayer groups in the Chapel. We will let you know who has been selected for this important position in the next few weeks.

Daily Act of Worship

A reminder that daily Acts of Worship take place each day either in classes or within a larger group. For example, Key Stage, House, or Year groups.

To start the year, we thought it would be appropriate to remind you all about the four parts of our

Acts of Worship as were mentioned in the summer's newsletter.

WE GATHER

The children gather together ready for prayer. They may gather listening to or singing a piece of music.

They might place a meaningful item onto the focal point of the Act of Worship like a prayer table.

They may sit quietly focusing on their breathing, being still and / or thinking about how their day is going.

We Listen

We listen to a piece of scripture from the Bible . This can either be a reading that relates to something that is happening at school or one that links to the liturgical year.

We Respond

Our response can be in silence or in words.

We think about what the scripture reading is saying to us. We might tell others what we think or feel. We might think about the words of scripture and reflect on how it relates to us.

Our Mission

A mission is a task that we carry out in response to what we have heard and reflected on in our Act of Worship.

The task might be an action like doing a kind act, saying the right thing or thinking well of others.

Our mission is always carried out by using Jesus as the example.

Prayers at St. Anthony's

Pope Francis says: Prayer opens the door to the Holy Spirit

As well as daily Act of Collective Worship, classes pause at three specific times in the day for prayer.

The children pray at the beginning of the day after Registration, at lunchtime and at the end of the day.

These important times of our day are a way of pausing and reflecting on God's work in our lives in peace and stillness.

At the beginning and end of the day, the children will have the chance to say together, traditional prayers or prayers that they have written themselves.

However at lunchtime, our prayers will relate to a specific intention. Just before noon, a bell is rung to signal the end

Mini Vinnies



Our Mini Vinnies are back this year!

Early in September, we will be meeting members of the Holy Rood Parish SVP group to discuss parish and community projects we can get involved in.

In their first year, the Mini Vinnies got involved in the following projects:

Designing Christmas cards for those living in shelters or care homes.

Attending Mass and lunch with the parish Ascent Group at Holy Rood Church where the children spoke about school life and sang the Mini Vinnie song.

Attended a talk given by local parishioner, Brian O' Riordan about the history of Holy Rood Church.

Took a lead role in the school's Crowning of Mary by leading the procession in front of the whole school and visitors.

Designed a display for Holy Rood Church to highlight the work of the local foodbank and St. Anthony's links to it.

In September we shall be inviting more children to consider becoming a Mini Vinnie as we look to take on at least one major project each term to help those within their school and parish community.

We hope that I will lead many of our children to play some kind of life-long role as a Vincentian.

Rooted In Love

Rooted in Love is the result of a collaboration between Westminster Diocese and Caritas to help support the delivery of Catholic Social Teaching at St. Anthony's.

We started this initiative in the last summer term when we invited the children to carry out work on human dignity.

We shall be devoting all our display boards in the School Hall to each topic so when you visit the school please ensure that you have a look at the important work the children are doing.

Please see details below of the two topics we shall be covering this autumn.

Care of Creation

In his Encyclical, Laudato Si, Pope Francis says, 'Creation is a gift, it is a wonderful gift that God has given us, so that we care for it and we use it for the benefit of all. Living our vocation to be protectors of God's handiwork is essential to a life of virtue; it is not an optional or a secondary aspect of our Christian experience.'

This half term's work will look at how Christians have a duty to care for and protect God's world because Creation is His wonderful gift.

Preferential Option for the Poor

The Church holds that we should all have a special focus on supporting, walking alongside, and sharing with people who are living in poverty. Pope Francis's much quoted phrase about wanting 'a poor church for the poor'. The option for the poor includes talking with, and listening to, those who are living in poverty. It is not just thinking that we know what people want or need, but listening to people, sharing in their suffering, being the 'voice for the voiceless' when it is not being heard.

Next half term, our work will explore ways we can be a voice for those in need through practical tasks that we hope will make a real difference to people in our parish and community.
