<u>RE</u>

Below is a summary of what the children got up to during Forest School this week. Please ensure children are wearing appropriate clothing again on Monday.

Forest School

Emma opened the session with a poem called 'Mother Earth'. It was about treating the Earth with respect and kindness and being grateful for all it gives us. It invited us to consider what we can do to look after the Earth so it can be there for us too. Then Emma introduced our Animal Feelings cards. These are four different animals (hedgehog, fox, deer, squirrel) which signify different emotions through energy levels and feelings of pleasantness/unpleasantness. The children considered how they were feeling today and which animal they identified with the most.

Next Emma taught everyone a new game called 'Bat and Moth'. This game helps to demonstrate how bats use echolocation to navigate in the dark to find food and avoid obstacles. It is also a lot of fun!

Our next task was a group challenge to see if all the children could work together to make a giant poppy out of leaves. Both classes rose to the challenge and created a beautiful poppy that we all stood around. In the morning, we finished it by 11am and had our two minute silence around it. In the afternoon, we had a moment of peace and a gratitude reflection.

For the rest of the session, lots of children chose to weave poppies around a cross with red and black wool. Other children made their own firework rockets with Emma. This involved using palm drills to create a hole in a piece of elder wood and manipulating pipe cleaners and ribbons. The children really enjoyed launching their rockets and seeing how far they would fly! We put up a hammock today and children enjoyed experiencing it. Hammocks have a lot of great benefits for children including sensory stimulation, encouraging balance and coordination, developing gross motor skills, and risk taking and management. Some children chose to help Carrie dig and prepare the wildflower area for the winter. They showed a lot of strength and perseverance.

At the end of the session, we had a reflection about what we were grateful for today and then we discussed the Curiosity Corner for the day. This was a stick with markings on it. Emma told the children about people who are Trackers and the kind of signs they look for in nature. The children discussed whether the marks could have been from claws or teeth and began hypothesising about which animal it could have been. There are definitely some budding Trackers in Year 4!
