## **Christmas Party**

Below is a summary of what the children got up to during their final Forest School session this week.

#### Forest School

It was a cold day today, but all the children showed a lot of resilience and rose to the challenge of keeping themselves warm and active.

We started the session with the game 'Fox and Rabbit' which the children enjoyed so much last week. Then Emma told the children a story called 'The Spruce and the Star'. The moral of which is about being happy and content with what you have and having an appreciation for the natural world. Before the children's free choice time, we played the running game 'Ostrich Tag' to ensure everyone had warmed themselves up sufficiently.

Last week, lots of children had asked for more Christmas crafts for their final session. Some children whittled sticks with Emma and created some lovely elf characters that they decorated in original ways. Other children chose to work with willow and made Christmas stars and trees. Both these activities were tricky; from manipulating the willow effectively, to problem solving how to secure the different pieces, and maintaining enough finger strength to finish the task. They exhibited a lot of perseverance and were proud of themselves for completing their projects. Some children were keen to use the ladders again and Nicki supervised them while they climbed to the top. They made up an entire imaginative game involving the ladders and our Forest Friends! Other children were busy den building with friends, and some helped the environment by doing litter pick.

We came back together at the end of the session and children shared their reflections about their Forest School experience this year. They discussed what their highlight had been and/or what they had got better at. It was lovely to hear their individual reflections. Highlights included: making fire, Emma's stories, the nettle soup, the mirror walk, and making the willow Christmas trees. Some of the thing's children said they had got better at included: connecting with nature, being creative and making things, picking nettles without getting stung, and trying new things.

We have thoroughly enjoyed this last term of Forest School with all of Year 4. They have been a pleasure to be with and have impressed us with their creativity, independence, and resilience.
