






FROM FR.TIM

We return to school after the half term break on November 3rd so this week Fr. Tim writes about the history and significance of All Saints Day.



The earliest observance of a feast in honour of all the saints is an early fourthcentury commemoration of "all the martyrs."

In the early seventh century, after successive waves of invaders had plundered the catacombs, Pope Boniface IV gathered up many relics of bones and reinterred them beneath the Pantheon, a Roman temple dedicated to all the gods.

The Pope rededicated the shrine as a Christian church. According to the Venerable St Bede, the pope intended "that the memory of all the saints might in the future be honoured in the place which had formerly been dedicated to the worship not of gods but of demons".

But the rededication of the Pantheon, like the earlier commemoration of all the martyrs, occurred in May. Many Eastern Churches still honour all the saints in the spring, either during the Easter season or immediately after Pentecost.

But how the Western Church came to celebrate this feast, now recognized as a solemnity, in November, is a puzzle to historians. The Anglo-Saxon theologian Alcuin observed the feast on 1 November in the year 800 A.D. The Holy See, in Rome, finally adopted this date in the ninth century.

Today's feast honours both the obscure as well as the famous; saints we hold dear and those unbeknown to us.
