Creation and Covenant


YEAR 2


Each week we will focus on a year group to help you understand more about our new Religious Education Curriculum Directory. The theme for the first half term throughout the school is Creation and Covenant.

FROM Fr. TIM

Saturday is the feast of St. Vincent de Paul. He is a saint who means a lot to us at St. Anthony's given our close connections with the SVP Society who do so much to support our children.

This is a good opportunity for Fr. Tim to share his thoughts about St. Vincent's work.

St. Vincent de Paul is well known for his service to the lowliest members of society. He was a French Catholic priest who dedicated his priestly life to the community outreach and evangelisation of the poor by founding the Congregation of the Mission. Through his example, St. Vincent de Paul teaches us to see Christ in the poor and suffering, helping us to live out Jesus' calling, "Whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me" (Matthew 25:40).

St. Vincent de Paul once said, "The poor have much to teach you. You have much to learn from them." As we speak and listen to the poor, we come to know better God and are humbled by the circumstances of others. By extending a helpful hand or lending an ear to the less fortunate, we show God's love and compassion to all. There are many ways we can demonstrate this love and acceptance. Consider one of the following:

Become a better active listener

Develop a family charity project that you and your siblings, parents, and other relatives can work on together for example donating to food banks and giving unwanted items to charity.

Become a Mini-Vinnie and help spread the values of St Vincent de Paul in your community/neighbourhood.

Speak out against injustice and hatred and show kindness to those less fortunate: the lonely, the friendless, the forgotten.

Although we may not encounter the financially poor every day, we do face people daily who may be poor in their spirituality, relationships, knowledge, and other ways. By making an effort to lend a listening ear or helping hand to friends, family, people in your neighbourhood, the homeless, we can help to achieve the work of God on earth a little bit day by day.

It is worth the trouble to become the person you were meant to be! Fr Tim
