WELCOME ASSEMBLY

Some of our Year 6 children led the welcome by speaking about St. Anthony and how his spirit of learning, good works and prayer are lived out in the school.

FEAST OF ST. FRANCIS OCTOBER 4th

This Saturday is the feast of St. Francis of Assisi. St. Anthony was part of the Franciscan Order and so his feast has special significance for our school.

A symbol of this was when the Key Stage 2 building was named after him at its official opening in 2014.

Our Year 2 children will be marking St. Francis' feast by doing special St. Francis activities on Friday.

Here is an outline of his life:

St. Francis of Assisi was born in 1181 or 1182 in Assisi, Italy, to a wealthy cloth merchant, and lived a comfortable life as a child, enjoying parties and fine clothes. As a young man, he fought in a war and was captured,



but after being released, he began having visions from God that changed his life. One vision told him to "repair my church,". Francis eventually gave up all his money and belongings to live a simple life of poverty and prayer.

Francis became kind and gentle, especially toward those who were sick or poor, and he famously showed love to a leper by hugging him, even though others were afraid to go near. He started preaching about God's love and living simply, and many people followed him, forming the Franciscan Order. He loved animals and nature, calling them his brothers and sisters. In 1224, he received the stigmata—the wounds of Jesus—and he died in 1226 at age 44. He was made a saint just two years later.

St. Anthony was a follower and close friend of St. Francis. Originally an Augustinian priest, Anthony joined the Franciscan Order in 1220, becoming one of Francis' followers known as the Friars Minor. Though their personal meetings were few, they shared a deep spiritual bond. St. Francis authorized Anthony to teach theology to the friars, reflecting Francis' trust in Anthony's wisdom. Anthony was known for his preaching, teaching, and care for the poor, continuing the mission started by Francis. Together, they represent two important saints of the Franciscan family, with Francis as the founder and Anthony as a key preacher and teacher within the order.

YEAR 5


This half term, the children are starting their studies on the new RE curriculum entitled, *To Know you More Dearly*. The curriculum is divided into 6 branches studied across the year.

FROM Fr. TIM

Wednesday marks the beginning of October, the month of the Rosary. This week, Fr. Tim writes about its significance in our lives.

To nip a common misconception in the bud, the rosary is a deeply scriptural meditative prayer. Scriptural, in the sense that it follows the life of Mary and Jesus, i.e. the Gospels.

Although the rosary devotion spread during the Middle Ages through the likes of St Alvery, St Dominic and Pope Pius V, its origins date as far back as the third century when the Desert Fathers used stones and later knotted rope when praying the Our Father and the entirety of the psalms – 150!

Today, the rosary has developed into the recitation of five decades – prefaced by the Our Father and concluding with the Glory Be and the Fatima Prayer. The decade



consists of 10 Hail Mary's and each decade focuses on an important event in the life of Mary and Jesus. For example, the Nativity of our Lord, The Crucifixion and The Resurrection.

There are four mysteries of the rosary: Joyful (prayed on Mondays and Saturdays) Sorrowful (prayed on Tuesdays and Fridays) Glorious (prayed on Wednesdays and Sundays) and Luminous (prayed on Thursdays and instituted by Pope St John Paull II)

Each mystery contains five events on which to focus on – one decade for each event.

Personally, the rosary is similar to the Stations of the Cross, in that we walk with Jesus and Mary, meditating as we do on the history of salvation that Mary and Christ has won for us.

The Rosary is quite possibly the most powerful devotion in the Catholic Church and one would do well to pray this as often as possible. I recommend starting with a decade a day and increase this gradually as you become more familiar with it.

A helpful way to pray the rosary is to devote each decade for an intention: this can be anything from praying for friends, family, those who are ill or dying or even for more general things like before an exam or more serious issues like an end to war and the attainment of peace.

May our Lady inspire all those who read this to develop a love not only for her but for her Son to whom she always leads and for whom she has given her life when she said yes to God at the Annunciation.
