Forest school

At the session, we discussed the fact that it was a cold day today and that it can be challenging to be outdoors in this type of weather. We spoke about how we could look after our bodies today and a key way of doing this is movement. Emma showed the children some different exercises they could do if they were feeling cold during the session. We feel both classes coped very well and showed resilience in the cold.

Next we had a discussion about needs. 'Needs Understanding' practice is a way of understanding ourselves and others better. Emma explained that we have needs to survive (e.g. sleep, water, shelter) and needs to thrive. Emma shared some of these different needs that help us grow and thrive as human beings; for example, connection, purpose, creativity, discovery, fun. Then the children tuned into how they were feeling today and shared what their primary need was for Forest School today.

After this we played a game called Giants, Wizards and Elves that incorporated a lot of movement to keep us warm. It is a game involving two ever-evolving teams and everyone really enjoyed playing this. Back at the log circle, Emma told a story called 'How the Stars Came to Be' which is a fun and imaginative folk tale about how the stars were originally created and then the children began the free choice element of the session.

The craft activities followed the star theme of the story. Some children chose to create their own little wooden weaving boards using a hammer and nails to make their own star designs. They hammered the nails into a small wooden disc and then used their knot skills to tie wool on and wove it around the nails into a star shape. This activity helps to develop gross and fine motor skills, hand-eye coordination, and focus. Other children made their own star wands out of willow. This involved bending and manipulating the willow into a star shape and securing the shape in place with pipe cleaners. Children helped one another by holding the star shape in place for each other and it was lovely to witness this kindness and generosity. Some children used wool and cardboard to make their own star weaving designs. The mud kitchen and construction with the poles and ropes were popular in both sessions. In the morning, children who have been building dens most weeks elevated their structure into a far more skilled design and persevered when it fell down to rebuild and work out the problems. In the afternoon, the children made a hotel that they were very proud of and Emma gave it 5 stars on Tripadvisor! Another child made a swing and it presented a useful opportunity to chat about risk and risk management.

To finish, Emma and the children reflected on their session and discussed 'Needs Understanding' again. Children were able to name some of their needs that were met during the different activities. For example, fun and challenge on the slackline and creativity and purpose when making the star wands.

Key vocabulary: description, sensory language, figurative language, similes, metaphors, personification, expanded noun phrases.

Next week: The children will be starting a new topic on biographies.
