



Last week we made a start on our new RE Branch, *Prophecy and Promise*. Please see below examples of some work from Years 2 and 3.
















FROM FR.TIM

This week marks the time when we remember all those lost in war and conflict. On Tuesday, Elaine led an assembly inviting the children to reflect on the reasons why people around the world pause from their daily routines at 11am on November 11th. At St. Anthony's some of the older children watched the different poppy laying ceremonies around the country before our own two minutes silence.

Fr Tim's reflection this week is about remembrance.

We will remember them.

It is hard to escape the iconic flower associated with bloodshed, sacrifice, duty and honour: the poppy. We see it worn by many in our towns and cities, on our television screens and in churches and memorials during the month of



November where, too, is our custom, to remember all the Holy Souls and pray fervently for their peaceful repose.

Wearing the poppy is not a fashionable trend nor an indication of one's political alliance, rather, it is an acknowledgement of all those service men and women who courageously gave their lives in both World Wars 1914-1918 & 1939-1945 respectively.

Our Blessed Lord tells us, his disciples: "Greater love has no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends."

The service men and women; those whose names we know and those only known to God did just that. What is more, they did it not only for their 'friends' but for strangers; for generations of peoples that would come after them. They did so, with the purpose of bringing about peace.

The poppy rightly is the colour red. We know from our liturgy that the colour red is used on Good Friday as well as in commemoration of the martyrs who gave their lives in defence of the Faith and the Gospel. This colour, then, is certainly the colour of sacrifice; the colour of blood.

Today, as we know well, wars are not a thing of the past. However, there is some consolation that we are not in a World War, but, needless to say, war should always be the last resort after other avenues have been exhausted.

Remembrance Sunday, above all, is a time to pray for the repose of the souls of all who gave generously; both in service and with their lives. We should also keep in our prayers those men and women currently serving at home and abroad for the same aim as their predecessors: peace.

Thank God for all those who laid down their lives; they shall not be forgotten, we will remember them.

GOSPEL

LUKE 21:5-19

At that time: While some were speaking of the Temple, how it was adorned with noble stones and offerings. Jesus said, 'As for these things that you see, the days will come when there will not be left here one stone upon another that will not be thrown down.' And they asked him, 'Teacher, when will these things be, and what will be the sign when these things are about to take place?' And he said, 'See that you are not led astray. For many will come in my name, saying, "I am hel" and, "The time is at handi" Do not go after them. And when you hear of wars and tumults, do not be terrified, for these things must first take place, but the end will not be at once.' Then he said to them, 'Ration will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and pestilences. And there will be terrors and great signs from heaven. But before all this they will lay their hands on you and persecute you, delivering you up to the synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors for my name's sake. This will be your opportunity to bear witness. Settle it, therefore in your minds, not to meditate beforehand how to answer, for I will give you a mouth and wisdom, which none of your adversaries will be able to withstand or contradict. You will be delivered up even by parents and brothers and sisters, and relatives and friends, and some of you they will put to death. You will be hated by all for my name's sake. But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your lives.'
